Research related to

Migrant and Minority Ethnic Matters in Northern Ireland produced within Northern Ireland's Universities

This report presents a mapping of research engagement about matters related to migrant and minority ethnic ('MME') people, groups or subjects in Northern Ireland, recorded on the public repositories of Northern Irish universities. The project was undertaken by Migrant and Minority Ethnic Council of Northern Ireland led by Dr Dina Zoe Belluigi, supported by Amanda Lubit¹, in the period of January-April 2021. The project was partially supported through the ESRC Impact Acceleration Account in partnership with Queen's University Belfast.

Context

Northern Ireland is a region with an active research culture of local and international populations and subjects. Considerable research has been undertaken about and with the dominant in-groups of Northern Ireland; and as such, this project focussed on research about those whose ancestries, ethnicities, nationalities, racialisation, languages, religions and belief systems, access and participation are categorised or are self-identified as 'different to' that of the dominant in-groups.

This report offers a snapshot of the current research engagement undertaken by researchers within Queen's University Belfast ('QUB') and Ulster University² (UU) which relate to the broad umbrella term 'migrant and minority ethnic' matters (hereafter referred to as MME), specifically those studies that were conducted about/ with those people or communities in Northern Ireland. Diverse groups and people fall within this umbrella term and share no cross-cutting cultures, ancestry or traditions except that they live in the region of Northern Ireland and are either categorised or self-identify as falling outside of the dominant in-group demographics and cultures. Due to this heterogeneity, it is possible that some related research may have eluded our search process. Please see the p. 18 for more detail of those groups to which the current research collated relates.

Project process

Information about the research engagement items were collated, categorised (using 'tags') and archived during January – March 2021 to an open-source online reference management system (Zotero) which is hosted on the research page of the MME website for open access by members of the public. This report is drawn from the data of that archive, which includes the type of item; the subject areas, their sub-codes and related list of items; breakdowns of the identifications/ social groupings, academic disciplines and concepts covered; and the full bibliography. From that information, figures and graphs have been constructed, including a table which identify the authors who have recorded more than one item on their institutional database. The funding was limited and thus the search process was sufficient for a 'snap shot' but not indepth reading of the texts nor searching the institutional library databases. As such, it is possible that items may not be listed within the database or this report.

² This report does not offer a mapping of the Open University's research relating to this topic. The Open University's research search engine differs; with several campuses there is no way to search for research coming from the Northern Ireland campus. The portal is accessible at - http://oro.open.ac.uk/. A manual review was performed with a total of four relevant sources. Funding constraints impacted on more indepth searches on that platform; and thus the report does not claims an analysis of their outputs. However, the four items have been included within this document.

Subject areas


The subject areas were determined by MME Council, to be of particular concern to MME groups in NI. These included criminal justice, education, employment, environment, health, housing, discrimination and legislation. Coding (through 'tags') was inferred by both induction (from scans of the items), and from deduction (from the areas of concern and groups identified by the project partners). These tags are listed under each topic in more detail within the report. For a full list of tags see Appendix C, p.45.

The sources

Sources were collated from the databases that the two universities utilise to store and collate research items and to share information 'open access' with the public both utilise the 'Pure' software.



Academic outputs are recorded on these repositories to fulfil the <u>obligations</u> of public research institutions. The platform records information which is utilised for academic matters, such as providing information necessary "for assessing the quality of research in UK higher education institutions", through the system called the <u>Research Excellence Framework (REF)</u>; and for internal matters within institutions. As the current REF cycle is close to submission (2021), it is safe to assume that academic research outputs would have been uploaded by current staff for the past eight years. Prior to those published in 2014, this cannot be assumed. Items are manually updated and thus dependent on the capacity of the individual authors. A variety of 'types' of items are recorded on these platform, as indicated in the screen print below; an analysis of types of output are on p.22.

Annotated resource list

The items that were collated are accessible at https://www.mmecouncil.org/research.

This research archive acts as library with the information about the items, directly leading the reader to the institutional site. The information is publicly accessible, with the only additions being the coded tags added by the research team.

As this is a 'live' archive, more items may be added periodically. Note that this report refers to those items collected prior to April 2021.

Research per subject

There were a total of 176 sources recorded on the databases (see Appendix A, p. 24). These include: 88 from Queen's University (of which 9 are PhD theses), 84 from Ulster University (of which 2 are PhD theses), and 4 from Open University.




Figure 1: All items recorded on the databases categorised by subject

The items were categorised into eight categories: Criminal Justice, Education, Employment, Environment, Health, Housing, Discrimination, Legislation. Figure 1 visualises the number of sources that fall in each category. The largest category is Discrimination, a cross-cutting category that relates to all forms of discrimination (e.g. intolerance, discrimination in education/employment/health/housing, systemic discrimination, religious discrimination, sexual orientation discrimination, racism). The legislation category is also cross-cutting.

Looking at the remaining six categories shows that Criminal Justice (39) and Education (38) are the most commonly researched, while Environment (12) and Housing (18) are less researched than other topics.

Research in the last 5 years

Of the 176 sources placed in the Zotero database, 72 of them are from the past five years (January 2016 to March 2021). There are many potential ways to organize and analyse the data. Below the data have been broken into six categories (criminal justice, education, employment, environment, health and housing) with narrative explanation, bar graphs and lists of sources provided for each category. This allows for a better understanding of the specific topics being researched and areas where further research is required. Additionally, a section called Other Categories is included to allow for further understanding and visualization of two topics which cut across the six categories, specifically: Discrimination and Legislation.

Please note: Sources often appear in more than one category because they address more than one of the topics. Many sources are large comprehensive reports that address related but diverse concepts. Additionally, some sources may not fall into any of the categories if they do not address one of the identified areas. For this reason, a list of all sources in the database are included at the end of this report.




Figure 2: Research items per category produced in the last five years with an indication of what was undertaken before (dark colours indicate recent; light indicate date was over 5 years ago)

Fourty-one percent (41%) of the items recorded were produced in the last 5 years on average, though there is variation in which subjects were researched. This is indicated in Figure 2 which looks at all eight categories, comparing the number of sources over the past five years with the number of sources over all time. Further details on each category is presented in the following sub-sections with graphs presented to demonstrate subcategories. Some points of note are below:

- **Criminal Justice** This is one of the largest areas of research both in the past five years and over all time. 44% of research in this area has taken place in the past 5 years.
- **Education** This area of research is also heavily researched with numbers equivalent to those in criminal justice both over the past five years and over all time. 37% of research in this area has taken place in the past 5 years.
- **Employment** This area of research has significantly decreased over the past 5 years with 21% of employment research taking place in this time period.

- **Environment** This area of research has been the least popular over all time periods with only 12 sources referencing the environment. 50% of research in this area has taken place in the past 5 years.
- **Health** This area of research has significantly increased over the past 5 years with 61% of health research taking place in this time period.
- **Housing** Similar to environment this concept has been less researched over all time periods than other concepts (e.g. like criminal justice and education). It appears to have increased in popularity over the past years with 50% of housing research taking place in this time period.
- **Discrimination** This category should be considered separately from the others as it is a cross-cutting category that incorporates research from the other categories (e.g. it includes discrimination in education, employment, health and housing). It is a very heavily researched area over all time. Nearly one-third of all research on discrimination was published in the past five years.
- **Legislation** This category should be considered separately from the others as it is also cross-cutting, incorporating research from other categories. It is moderately well researched over all time. 36% of research in this area has taken place in the past 5 years.

Discrimination (past 5 years)

Twenty-seven items (or 38%) of the 72 sources recorded over the past five years have tags that fall under the category of Discrimination, a cross-cutting category. These sources can be broken into nine sub-categories: Educational Discrimination, Employment Discrimination, Health Discrimination, Housing Discrimination, Intolerance / Public Attitudes, Racism, Religious Discrimination, Sexuality Discrimination, Structural Discrimination.

Please note: Unlike other categories where all sources were assigned to one primary sub-category to allow for quantification, discrimination is handled differently. All types of discrimination were counted independently, meaning that if a source addresses multiple types of discrimination, which is common, it would be counted several times. This approach to quantification allows for a better understanding of what types of discrimination get mentioned and how frequently.




Figure 3: Finer coded items within the 'discrimination' category

The distribution of research on discrimination is visualized in the graph below. The following are some observations:

- **Education / Employment / Health / Housing** These four categories refer to specific contexts where discrimination and intolerance occur. Although education has been a common area of research over all time (appearing in 14 sources) it has become less of a focus in the past 5 years (3 sources). The other three contexts are the subject of little research with only one source in the past 5 years looking at discrimination in employment and health, and none looking at housing.
- **Religious Discrimination** Religious discrimination is not a common focus (appearing in 5 sources over all time, and 2 in the past 5 years.
- **Sexuality Discrimination** Discrimination on the basis of sexuality has become a more commonly mentioned issue. It has appeared in five sources in the past five years compared with eight source over all time.
- **Systemic Discrimination** Systemic discrimination, intolerance and racism appear in 11 sources over all time, and 5 in the past 5 years.
- **Intolerance** Public attitudes and intolerance towards minorities and migrants is a common focus of research (appearing in 29 sources over all time, and 9 in the past 5 years).
- **Racism** The majority of research over all time focuses upon racism (appearing in 42 sources) though it has become less of a focus in the past five years (12).

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Criminal Justice (past 5 years)

Seventeen of 72 sources (24%) over the past five years have tags that fall under the category of Criminal Justice. These sources can be broken into six sub-categories: domestic abuse, forced labour, hate crime, policing, prostitution, human trafficking. Although sources may address several of these subcategories, for simplification each source was assigned to one primary sub-category to allow for quantification.




Figure 4: Finer coded items within the 'criminal justice' category

The distribution of research on criminal justice is visualized in Figure 4. The majority of research over the past five years focuses upon hate crime (9 of 17 sources, or 53%). Less frequently researched were the topics of policing (3 of 17, or 18%) and forced labour (2 of 17, or 12%). Finally, domestic abuse, prostitution, and human trafficking were the focus of one source (1 of 17, or 6% each).

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Education (past 5 years)

Fourteen of 72 sources (19%) over the past five years have tags that fall under the category of Education. These sources can be broken into four sub-categories: Education Inequalities, Language, Student Attitudes, Traveller Education. Although sources may address several of these subcategories, for simplification each source was assigned to one primary sub-category to allow for quantification.




Figure 5: Finer coded items within the 'education' category

The distribution of research on education is visualized in Figure 5. The majority of research over the past five years focuses upon languages (7 of 14, or 50%), looking at language diversity, language learning and teaching of English as a second language. The remaining sources look at educational inequalities (3 of 14, 21%), student attitudes towards minorities and migrants (3 of 14, 21%), and Traveller education (1 of 14, 7%).

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Employment (past 5 years)

Six of 72 sources (8%) over the past five years have tags that fall under the category of Employment. This category is significantly underrepresented in recent research compared with the 29 sources identified on employment when considering all years. These sources can be broken down into three sub-categories: Asylum Seekers / Refugees, Migrant Labour and Workplace Discrimination.

The distribution of research on employment is visualized in the graph below. Research over the past five years focuses upon each of the three identified sub-categories equally, though it is important to keep in mind that the numbers are very small.

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Environment (past 5 years)

Six of 72 sources (8%) over the past five years have tags that fall under the category of Environment. These sources are not further broken down into sub-categories as all address similar topics of place-making and shared spaces. For this reason no figure is provided.

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Legislation (past 5 years)

Ten items (or 14%) of 72 sources recorded over the past five years have tags that fall under the category of Legislation. These sources can be broken into five sub-categories: Brexit, Hate Crime, Modern Slavery, Race Relations, Social Services. Although sources may address several of these subcategories, for simplification each source was assigned to one primary sub-category to allow for quantification.

The distribution of research on legislation is visualized in Figure 7. This demonstrates that research is nearly evenly distributed between the five sub-categories.

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Health (past 5 years)

Seventeen (or 24%) of 72 sources over the past five years have tags that fall under the category of Health. These sources can be broken into five sub-categories: Health Inequities, Mental Health/Wellbeing, Substance Use, Suicide, Women's Health. Although sources may address several of these subcategories, for simplification each source was assigned to one primary sub-category to allow for quantification.

The distribution of research on health is visualized in the graph below. The majority of research on health over the past five years focuses upon mental health and wellbeing (7 of 17, or 41%) or general health inequities and inequalities (5 of 17, or 29%). Less research focuses specifically upon women's health (3 of 17, or 18%) with one article on pregnancy and two on female genital cutting / mutilation. Finally, both substance use and suicide appear as the focus of one source (1 of 17, or 6%), indicating that further research is needed in these areas.




Figure 8: Finer coded items within the 'health' category

Housing (past 5 years)

Nine of 72 sources (13%) over the past five years have tags that fall under the category of Housing. These sources can be broken into four sub-categories: asylum seekers/refugees, hate crime, housing policy, Travellers. Although sources may address several of these subcategories, for simplification each source was assigned to one primary sub-category to allow for quantification.

The distribution of research on housing is visualized in the graph below. The majority of research over the past five years focuses upon asylum seekers and refugees, though this is partly due to the fact that five of the six sources were written by the same authors (Murphy & Vieten).




Figure 9: Finer coded items within the 'housing' category

Finer Coding

All Tags in the Online Management Archive

'Tags' are codes added to each item. Knowing about the tags are value for those who wish to search, retrieve and analyse the items recorded on the online reference management archive – which is accessible at https://www.mmecouncil.org/research.

Categorized Tags

This section provides information of all the tags added (excluding specific organisations and names) and breaks them into groups by information of demographics (Table 1, p.19), concepts and research discipline with which they are associated. These groupings may be different than what is seen in the sections on "Research by Topic" because they are more nuanced and specific than the primary category of each item. These breakdowns are provided to make it easier to understand the tags utilized (provided in from most to least and/ or in alphabetical order) to provide alternative ways of looking at the data in the future. No discussion or main points are provided on these topic groupings because they were previously discussed in great detail the sections above.

Additional detail is provided for demographic term groupings because this aspect did not receive previous attention. The number of tags (in parentheses) for these terms provides some additional context about the sources in the database that go beyond the categories described above. Below are the main takeaway points from this quantification:

- Demographics Overall, issues relating specifically to the listed demographic categories were
 underrepresented and under-researched. The most common demographic to appear in sources was
 gender appearing in 10% of sources, most often relating to women. Sexuality and LGBT populations
 appeared less frequently in 4% of sources. Age was the least frequently addressed with just one
 mention.
- Language Language was a commonly mentioned topic, appearing in 28 sources (16%). Those most mentioned fell into three categories: Chinese (7), Eastern European (7 total 4 Polish, 3 Lithuanian), Subcontinental (6 total 4 Indian and 2 Pakistani). [Many languages use the same term as ethnicity/nationality (e.g. Chinese) so to separate out times when the term was used to refer to languages vs. populations, I selected the tag for Language and then selected the specific language terms.]
- Migrants & Minorities Most terms in this category are broad generalisations (e.g. migrants, minorities). Most significant, the terms refugee (26) and asylum seekers (24) appeared frequently in 14% of sources. Less common were the terms relating to first generation migrants (3), second generation migrants (2), and undocumented workers (2).
- Race, Ethnicity & Nationality Many different identities were mentioned and are listed below. However, few publications focus specifically upon one population. The most tagged populations were Chinese (17), Indian (17), Polish (16), and Traveller (18) populations.
- **Religion** Religion did not commonly appear in any of the sources and was not the focus of any sources. Most of the tags for religion occurred in articles on hate crime and discrimination.

Overview of the items per institution

This has been broken down into two of the institutions, as the Open University's online portal was not readily searchable. A table of authors from these institution (who have recorded more than one item) can be found on p. 50.

Queen's University Belfast




Figure 10: Visualisation of the types of items related to MME matters recorded by QUB

Eighty-eight (88) items that related to MME matters were collated from the platform at QUB in the months of January-March 2021. These included 33 journal articles; 17 reports; 15 books or book chapters; 9 dissertations; 6 blogs, 2 TV broadcasts, 1 podcast; 2 magazine articles; 1 hearing and 1 evidence submission. A visualisation is represented in Figure 10.

Of the items traditionally associated with 'academic contribution', 66 were collated as matching the criteria for this project. In terms of the total of items collected for this project, this amounted to 55% (i.e. that published for the academic community). The total amount of items uploaded at this institution are indicated below.

A fifth of the items relating to MME were reports composed for **public, charity or funding bodies**. It is possible that many researchers do not upload such reports to this portal.

Those items related to public engagement activities, including dissemination of research, participation/information for members of the public bodies, are 14% of the total items. It is possible that many researchers do not upload such activities on this portal.

Student dissertations were 11% of the items collected for the project. However, it is possible that more are being hosted on the institutional library portal because it is only since since December 2020, that QUB has been 100% compliant with open access requirements (see p.60).

Ulster University

84 items were collated from UU, of which 31 journal articles and 1 text for an academic audience, 11 books/book chapters, 8 conference presentations; 30 reports; 1 blog; 2 student theses. A visualisation is represented in Figure 11.

Of the items traditionally associated with 'academic contribution', 52 were collated as matching the criteria for this project. In terms of the total of items collected for this project, this amounted to 65% (i.e. that published for the academic community). The total amount of items uploaded at this institution are indicated below.




Figure 121: Visualisation of the types of items related to MME matters recorded by UU
